# Granite City Kennel Club "Field of Champions" Invitational Dog Show

Reprinted from Dec. Jan, 1998-99 Gun Dog PostScript

The American Kennel Club recently approved a dog show that will be limited to conformation champions that also possess field titles, the first show of its type to ever be approved by the AKC.

The show, a "special attraction" under AKC regulations, has been named The Granite City Kennel Club "Field of Champions" Invitational Dog Show, and will be held in St. Cloud, Minnesota on Friday, December 4, 1998, the day before Granite City's two all-breed dog shows.

Eligibility requirements: Dogs must have met both the conformation and minimum performance standards for their breed. What this means is that all sporting breeds, for example, must be dual champions or champions with an AFC, MH, SH or JH to enter. The same requirements, a conformation championship with an AKC field title, would be true for sight hounds, herding breeds and breeds eligible for earthdog tests.

For breeds where there is no formal AKC performance testing program, dogs must possess a conformation championship and a working certificate from the par4ent club, provided the parer club is a member of the American Kennel Club. Dogs in this category would include the large hunting terriers such as

Airedales as well as the working group and some of the nonsporting breeds such as poodles. Spayed and neutered dogs can compete in this show provided they meet the eligibility requirements for their breed.

Judging: There will be five groups judged at this show—sporting, hounds, terriers, herding and working. Dogs in the non-sporting and toy groups that are eligible for this show will be judged in the group where their work applies; i.e., poodles will be judged with the sporting group and silky terriers with the terrier group. The judges will be AKC conformation judges with considerable field experience.

There are no points connected with this show because the AKC has approved it as a "special attraction." But there certainly are some significant bragging rights on the line because this is the national show for dual-titled dogs.

This is an exciting development on the part of the AKC and there is a great deal of interest among breed clubs which continue to stress the importance of dogs that look good and can do what they were bred to do. Preliminary response to this concept has indicated that entries could exceed 250 dogs representing more than 65 breeds. We expect the largest number of dogs in the sporting group because the hunting test program has been in existence longer than the herding, lure coursing or earthdog programs.

The "Field of Champions" Dog Show will be followed on December 5, 1998 and December 6, 1998 by Granite City Kennel Club's two all-breed dog shows. These annually attract about 1,000 dogs representing almost all of the 140 breeds eligible for registration with the American Kennel Club each day. This year, at the all-breed shows, many of the dogs that competed in the "Field of Champions: show will be involved in demonstrations designed to educate the public about AKC performance testing programs as well as educating the public about what the dogs actually were bred to do.

When we picked Bosco up, we'd already been told most of his story. He had apparently been chained up with a too tight collar on; the chain and collar had rubbed away his fur. At some point he was abandoned in a state park, where park rangers noticed him for several weeks. He followed, for about twenty miles, a woman exercising her horse in the park and she took him in. He received veterinary care paid for by Labrador Retriever Rescue, but complications for his neutering resulted in a hematoma, which required additional medical attention.

Our other Lab loved Bosco, so we took him home and he made a very smooth adjustment to our family. Weeks later we learned that he had a cancerous tumor in his groin. He had successful surgery but spend months on steroids, which depressed him.

Throughout all his difficulties, he remained very sweet and affectionate; although, he continued to act very submissive with his head down and ears back.

Bosco started private obedience lessons shortly after being taken off medication, when he was approximately 18 months. He did very well and his confidence increased dramatically. He now perks his ears up and holds his head high! He continued obedience in a group lesson where he stood out as a 65 lb. Chocolate Lab in a class of German Shepherds! They didn't intimidate him!

Bosco continues to remain healthy. Most of his fur has grown back and is thick and shiny. He looks like a different dog now. He enjoys playing with our Lab and our cats, and he is wild about sprinklers! We have taught him to jump on the couch without asking first, and our bed is his bed! He is a tough little dog who overcame a lot of obstacles and we're trying to give him the loving home he deserves.

## Tattoo gets dog home after 4 years

Hanover, NH. When Cam and Heidi Eldred lost their purebred chocolate Labrador 4 ½ years ago, they took out newspaper and radio ads, offered a \$250 reward, and their four young daughters made posters and tacked them to utility poles around town

But it was the dog's tattoo that brought her home.

Six weeks ago, Mr. Eldred received a call at his office. Sally had been found by a Dartmouth College student and turned over to a local veterinarian.

The vet noticed Sally's tattoo and called the National Dog Registry, which identified Sally's owners.

"I just couldn't believe it," Mr. Eldred said. "Sally had been gone for so long that we'd just completely given up hope, almost."

When Sally was a puppy, the Eldreds had her tattooed and registered with the dog registry, a non-profit agency based in Woodstock, NY. The dark blue mark was applied to Sally's inner thigh.

One out of every five dogs is stolen or lost each year, according to the dog registry, which began in 1966 and now catalogs more than 7 million pets.

While Sally was gone, the Eldreds replaced her first with a coonhound named Henry, who one day bit a UPS driver and later was put to sleep, then a chocolate Lab named Lucy accidentally died.

"We were starting to feel like this is the black hole for animals," Heidi Eldred said.

They then got a pug; and a few weeks later, Sally came home.

But the story does not end there.

When Sally was found, she could barely walk; she had, it later was discovered, a lung tumor.

Typically, a dog with a lung tumor is put to sleep because makes walking unbearable due to inflammation of the bones.

Family vet Deborah Kelloway said the family asking if there was anything that could be done. So in an unusual and expensive procedure, doctors used a CT scan to pinpoint the tumor's location and after undergoing radiation treatment, Sally has improved.

"She was up and walking and they were able to discontinue any pain medication," Dr. Kelloway said.

It remains uncertain how much longer Sally, who is 10 will live; but that does not seem to matter.

"She came back to us and that in itself is wonderful," Mr. Eldred said.


The top 10 ways you know that Martha Stewart is stalking your dog:
