## Elbow Study at Cornell

A Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine researcher says she may have developed a cure for large breed dogs that develop arthritis as adults after suffering from a common forelimb lameness when they are puppies.

Such large breed dogs include Labradors, Newfoundlands and Rottweilers.

Ursula Krotscheck, DVM, Dipl. ACVS, assistant professor of clinical sciences, is now looking for puppies to enroll in a study to confirm her theory. She will work with the puppies free of charge, according to Cornell.

One of the more common causes of this disability is a bone problem in the elbow ioint called fragmented coronoid process. or FCP, according to Dr. Krotscheck. The condition is a result of the ulna growing faster than the bones next to it, creating extra pressure in the elbow joint and causing the ulna to chip.For years, veterinarians have been removing the bone chip to help dogs heal, but this treatment does not prevent the dogs from developing arthritis later in life, according to Krotscheck. The study will see whether an additional procedure to treat FCP may prevent arthritis for these dogs. As Cornell explained it, "When [Krotscheck] removes the bone chip in dogs with FCP, she also makes a cut in the ulna that allows it to rotate out of the way, reducing any unnecessary pressure in the elbow (continued at link below).

## **Optional Titling Classes**

Have you taken a look at any of the new optional titling classes in AKC Obedience. Starting last Summer, there is a titling new pre-novice class called Beginner Novice. Any dog can enter, you don't have to be without titles, so its not just for newbies its also a great spot for older dogs who enjoy the obedience ring but prefer not to jump. It is almost completely on lead, and is a great transition from rally. The heeling on leash is done to rally signs instead of listening to a judge's commands. The next task is a figure 8 on leash, followed by a

Sit for Exam. There is a long sit stay while the handler walks around the ring and returns to heel , and a recall much like the novice recall, off leash, 25 feet, with no finish required. Three qualifying scores of 170 and the dog is now a BN. I haven't entered myself but watched many classes this summer and fall and it really is a nice place to start, and I saw many older dogs enjoying their time back in the ring. The only caution is be sure that newbie has a good recall as I saw several nice performances that ended up non-qualifying as an eager young dog raced out of the ring on the recall.

Graduate Novice and Graduate Open are now optional titling classes. Optional because they are not required in the sequence to go from CD to CDX to UD to UDX. For Graduate Novice, any dog who has not earned the GN title may enter, and for some of us its a nice inbetween CD and CDX title to work on. There are those who don't prefer this class because the sequence isn't the same as for open, but it is a choice for some dogs. The skills are heel on lead, figure 8 off lead, drop on recall (with both hand and voice signal permitted), Dumbell Recall, recall over the high jump and recall over the broad jump. The group stay is a 3 minute out of sight down stay.

Graduate Open is another optional titling class for any dog who has not earned the GO title. It consists of Signal Exercise, Scent Discrimination, a3. Directed Retrieve, Moving Stand and Examination, Go Out, and Directed Jumping. Signals are done at 10-20 feet and can have both voice and signal commands, Scent articles is "articles-lite" with 2 metal, 2 leather and the need to retrieve only 1. The directed retrieve has only gloves 1 and 3, no middle glove. The moving stand, the handler may pause to give the command. The Go Out is just a go out, sending the dog 20 feet and having them turn and sit. The handler then returns to the dog. Directed jumping is just the jumping portion of this utility exercise where the handler positions the dog at the end of the ring instead of performing a goout. Only one jump is performed and is the same one for all dogs in the class.

The last optional titling class is Versatility. Any dog can enter, and one with the VER title can continue to show in this class. It has 12 variations of 2 novice exercises, 2 Open exercises and 2 utility exercises and no group stays.

# Training History

Pat lives with his wife Cynde, five children, and a grandson in Western Maryland, where he trains year-

round.

He has traveled and competed from northern Florida to northern Ontario. For many years, his family traveled with him, spending winters in South Carolina and summers in Canada and Vermont. Pat retired from competing in retriever field trials in 1999.

Pat continually strives to find new and better ways to present information. He is particularly interested in ways to motivate an animal's desire to learn. This approach underpins his successful work with dogs and is Pat's stock in trade. He has trained many dogs to the AKC Master Hunter level, including Chesapeakes, Flat-Coats, and the first Irish Water Spaniel Master Hunter. Pat personally trained 11 dogs that went on to complete their Field Champion titles. In addition, he trained and helped develop dogs that were awarded nine other Field Champion and Amateur Field Champion titles. He has placed Labs, Goldens, and Flat-Coats in Field Trials, and trained dogs that were finalists in both the National Open

Work with obedience has played an important role in shaping Pat's training approach. During the 1970s and 1980s he learned and taught the Koehler Method in obedience classes and for training guard dogs. From this experience he applies the lessons of canine good citizenship to training retrievers, believing that it's important that dogs and owners enjoy a safe and happy relationship, whether at home or hunting in the field. In addition to his work with dogs, Pat trained and handled deer, dogs, birds, and pigs for television and films, and trained and flew several species of hawks. Pat's creativity is evident in the work he did with hawks, where he learned how to devise motivational training set-ups and apply these techniques to dog training.

Pat Nolan Began training professionally in 1975 in Denver, Colorado working for a start-up guard dog company. In the early 1980's, Pat taught Koehler Method obedience classes in Hagerstown, Maryland. Several hundred dogs successfully completed the Novice classes. The graduation requirements for the Novice class were those used for the Companion Dog exam in the AKC obedience ring. He also taught the Open class, where dogs of all breeds learned the force fetch.

• Conduct home studies of people in your area who have applied to adopt from LRR. You and your Lab visit applicants, by appointment, and complete a home study form. Each visit takes 30 minutes to 1 hour.

• Evaluate Labs at shelters, vet clinics, or private homes for temperament, health, and to make sure the Lab is purebred. Each visit takes 30 minutes to 1 hour.

• Other opportunities include basic obedience training, transport, publicity, fundraising, public education.

#### Dear Milly

Two of my best helpers are my little red wagon with side-boards and my big red toboggan. The wagon is obviously used when there is no snow on the ground and it can hold quite a bit. However, the toboggan is the real winner. It is made of durable plastic, relatively inexpensive, and easily obtainable at hardware stores or Wal-Mart, etc. We use it in winter to carry dog food or to transport almost anything such as fire wood, shavings, etc. When we're

**From Providence:** Take Rte. 146 North to the Rte. 116 South (Mall) Exit. Go to the fourth light and turn right on to Rte. 7 North. Go 5.3 miles and turn left onto Tarklin Rd. Go 2 miles to Addieville East Farm on the left.

**From Worcester**: Take Rte. 146 South to the North Smithfield RI Exit. Bear left off exit. Go to first light and turn right on Victory Hwy. (Rte. 102 South. Go to second light and turn left on Rte. 7 South. Follow Rte 7 South 1.3 miles and turn right onto 10 Tarklin Rd. Go 2 miles to Addieville East Farm on the left.
