

There is a new DNA test which we've learned about, but too late for this cute dog we bred about two years ago. The breeding was an outcross for us and a total surprise.

The condition causes a dry cracked nose, lack of pigment around the lips, and sometimes even affects the foot pads. In our limited experience, it presents around the age of six months to a year of age. Sometimes it's very uncomfortable for the dog so it's a good thing as breeders we can now test to avoid the condition. In other dogs you'd never suspect they have this condition. They present with a dry nose, but no apparent cracking.

The genetics have shown that it is a simple recessive like PRA and EIC. The test is inexpensive in the scheme of all the tests we do, and in one generation it can be bred out of our lines. Even an affected dog can be bred if you like

everything else about the dog, so please test your breeding dogs. We at Grampian were shocked and surprised to find we'd produced it and now test all our unknowns. Please do the same with your dogs so that you never have to get the phone call that sounds like this: "What is wrong with my dog's nose?"



From the Field



Liz – Laying the Foundation with Rainer Fuchs.

Liz is now a six month old Chesapeake Bay Retriever with lots of drive. Her owner, Todd Smith recognized this very quickly once Liz came to his home as an eight week old puppy in late January of this year. Even as someone new to the sport, Todd knew getting off on the right track would be important. As the brutal winter of 2015 was coming to a close Todd began searching for training opportunities for both of "Peakes." He was fortunate to secure a spot in the Rainer Fuchs' Beginning Retriever Training Class sponsored by the Labrador Retriever Club of Greater Boston. Todd had heard great things about the class and knew of Rainer in his limited time in the "circuit." While Rainer was understandably concerned about Liz's young age; they agreed to try it out and see how she performed. After the first class there was little doubt young Liz was capable despite her young age of four months and size. Now that the seven classes have passed by in the blink of an eye; it seems appropriate to thank and recognize Rainer and his assistant Milly Secco for all their hard work in a well-executed and coordinated class. From registration to the last class they were provided with weekly handouts, training syllabus and support materials. The classes clearly reflected Rainer's style and approach to training that he relayed to them during the first class. Clearly Rainer and Milly are doing this for the love of the sport. It is obvious there are many more hours of work committed to his class beyond the class time. It was apparent that Rainer supplied most of the equipment used during the course. The class provided instruction to new handlers about the basics of being a bird boy; how to safely and effectively handle a popper gun and to operate a winger. Both Milly and Rainer were encouraging and supportive with each puppy and handler. They gave each of them enough attention and time to work out a success; even if it was a small one. Every handler and dog team presents a new challenge and opportunity for all to learn. Rainer pointed many of these "teaching opportunities" to the class at the end of each session. As an example Rainer ran a series of two single marks. The first was to instill confidence and the second was to challenge.



The first mark was a dead bird @ 90 yards (orange line) in light to medium cover. Liz's recall was good. Second mark is hard to distinguish from picture but down a steep incline across a 10 foot stream and up a steep incline to a dead bird @ 40 yards in no cover with exposed guns (red line). Liz needed a little encouragement to go through the stream, but managed to secure the bird and bring it back with more encouragement on Todd's part. Rainer pointed out the mark represents a number of challenges outside of the obvious retrieve; going down the hill and across the stream and up the hill and back again. Entering and exiting the stream from a steep incline is a particular challenge for a young dog. Rainer said let's run it again and see if she put it all together; and she did.

A similar scenario was run in water a week later. Marks were thrown in open water to instill confidence and to slightly challenge each puppy in terms of endurance and a second mark was thrown in "cover" through weeds, lily pads and sticks. Will the puppy persevere and ignore the distractions that were posed by the cover? Happy to report yes for Liz on both counts.

Todd couldn't be more pleased with the outcome. While he understands this course is only a start – the first stone laid for a solid foundation; he was able to learn many techniques to further his and Liz's development. He was able to understand the potential that Liz might have. He is sincerely appreciative of the efforts of Rainer and Milly. He gratefully acknowledges the Labrador Retriever Club of Greater Boston for having the foresight to sponsor such a class aimed at the development of new handlers and retrievers.
